SIAMS (Church School) Inspection

In March, we received a visit from a SIAMS inspector to review our effectiveness as a Church School. The day involved learning walks around school, meeting families, grilling governors, scrutinising data and interviewing staff. The inspection framework changed in September, raising the standards expected significantly. Attendance

I am so pleased that positive attendance improvements continue to be seen across school. We have, again, seen the best attendance in school for a number of years and are thrilled to see this improving consistently. As you will know from the newsletter, we are still falling slightly short of our overall target for attendance (96%), but I am sure with everyone's joint effort, we can meet this by the end of the year.



Growth Mindset

We began the spring term introducing the idea of a 'growth mindset' to children across school. This encourages all children to believe that they can do something, even if they can't <u>yet.</u>

Growth Mindset also encourages children to see learning as a journey, often ending up in 'the learning pit'. Children are also encouraged to look at 'failure' as a positive thing (something that is simply part of a bigger learning process). We often refer to this as our first attempt in learning. We can really see impact in how children are approaching new learning in school.

Behaviour Policy

We have updated our behaviour policy this term and shared details with families. Our new approach looks to educate children about inappropriate and positive behaviour, as well as restore things amongst friends when things go wrong.

Spiritual Development

Over the term, we have worked with children to develop spirituality by asking big questions and exploring ideas together. We held an incredibly successful spirituality day earlier in the term to allow children the opportunity to explore, question and think about key ideas. The results were simply fascinating and can be seen on display in school.
